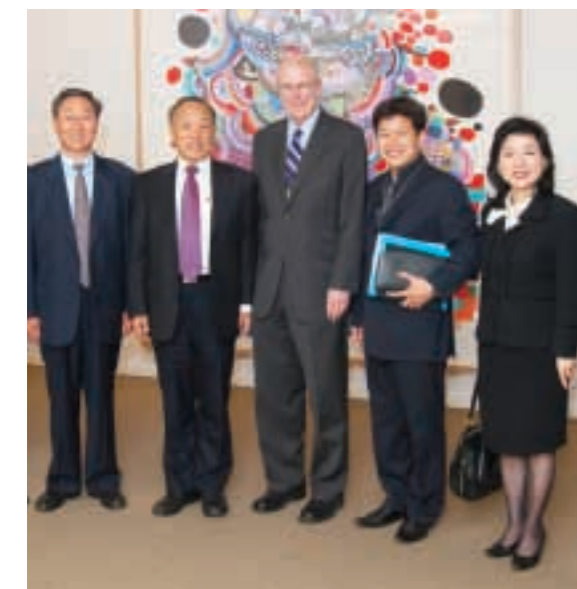

The Foundation also arranged for Mr. Li Zhaoxing, Chairman of the National People's Congress (NPC) Foreign Affairs Committee and Former Chinese Foreign Minister; Madam Wu Xiaoling, Vice Chairlady, NPC Financial and Economic Affairs Committee; Mr. Jiang Jichu, Member of the NPC Foreign Affairs Committee and Mr. Xu Jianmin, Member of the NPC Environment and Resource Protection Committee to speak at a luncheon forum at the RAND Corporation in Santa Monica. Mr. Li and other delegation members shared with participants their views on the different aspects of their work and the obstacles that confront the U.S.-China relationship.

In June, Foundation Governor Mr. Daniel Fung attended the Shangri-La Dialogue in Singapore, an annual meeting for defense ministers and international experts to discuss critical issues relating to global and regional security. The President of the Republic of Korea, Mr. Lee Myung-Bak and U.S. Secretary of Defense, Dr. Robert Gates were among the keynote speakers at the conference.

Foundation CEO Speaks at National Lieutenant Governors Association Annual Meeting and Attends the National Urban League's Centennial Conference

Sponsored by the National Lieutenant Governors Association (NLGA), Foundation CEO, Ms. Clarie Lo attended the NLGA Annual Meeting in Biloxi, Mississippi. She delivered a luncheon address entitled "The Role of International Relations and the Global Economy in Economic Recovery" emphasizing the need for greater levels of mutual understanding and economic cooperation between China and the U.S. and also focusing on how U.S. Lieutenant Governors could help improve the China-U.S. relationship and in the process, further the global economic recovery.

Resulting from a previous exchange program with the National Urban League (NUL), Ms. Lo was invited to attend the NUL Centennial Conference events in Washington D.C. The event was attended by President Obama and senior U.S. officials including the U.S. Secretary for Labor, Ms. Hilda Solis; Secretary for Commerce, Mr. Gary Locke; Secretary for Education, Mr. Arne Duncan; U.S. Ambassador to the UN, Ms. Susan Rice; Congressmen and other business and community leaders.

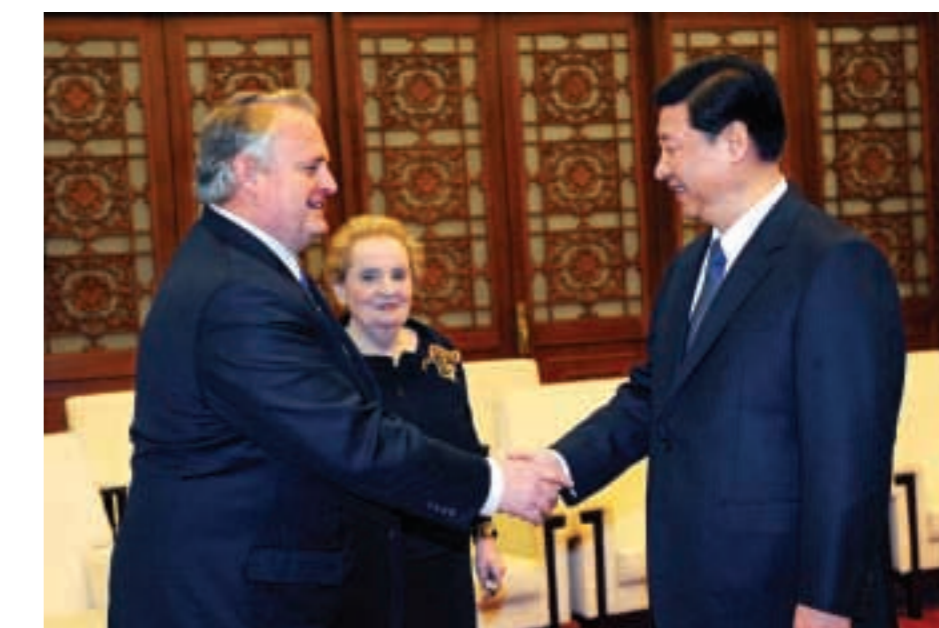

Foundation Sponsors First-Ever U.S.-China Political Party Leadership Breakthrough Dialogues

From March 31 to April 2, 2010, the Foundation and the New York-based NGO EastWest Institute (EWI) jointly sponsored in Beijing the first dialogue on international and bilateral issues between senior leaders from the U.S. Democratic and Republican parties and representatives of the Communist Party of China (CPC).

The U.S. delegation which travelled to China for the historic talks was represented by Dr. Madeleine Albright, Former U.S. Secretary of State; Ambassador Richard Williamson, Former U.S. Special Envoy to Sudan; Mr. Lorne Craner, President of the International Republican Institute; Mr. Thomas A. Daschle, Former U.S. Senate Majority Leader; Mr. Howard Dean, Former Governor of Vermont and Former Chairman of the Democratic National Committee; Mr. Mike Duncan, Former Chairman of the Republican National Committee; Mr. John Mroz, President and CEO of EWI; Mr. Ross Perot, Jr., Chairman-Elect of EWI; Mr. Vin Weber, Former U.S. Congressman from Minnesota and Mr. Ken Wollack, President of the National Democratic Institute.

The Chinese delegation was led by Mr. Wang Jiarui, Minister of the International Department of the CPC Central Committee,



and Mr. Liu Jieyi, Vice Minister of the International Department of the CPC Central Committee. The U.S. and Chinese delegates met with representatives from the Chinese government, including Mr. Xi Jinping, Vice President of the People's Republic of China and member of the Politburo Standing Committee; Mr. Dai Bingguo, State Councilor, and representatives of the CPC's United Front Work Department and the Taiwan Affairs Office of the State Council.

African-American Leaders Visit China

From January 31 to February 4, 2010, the National Urban League (NUL), with the support of the Foundation and in collaboration with the Chinese People's Institute of Foreign Affairs (CPIFA), organized a visit for 46 influential African-Americans to China. It was the first time a national African-American leadership group of this size visited Beijing. The event aimed at enhancing greater understanding of China's political, business and academic environments as well as exploring cooperative opportunities between the Chinese and African-American communities.

The visit was led by Mr. Marc. H. Morial, President and Chief Executive Officer of the National Urban League, Mr. Blair Taylor, President and Chief Executive Officer of the Los Angeles Urban League, Mr. Albert E. Dotson Jr., Chairman of 100 Black Men of America, Mr. Mark L. Mallory, Mayor of Cincinnati, and other leaders from government, the media, business and academia.

In Beijing, the group met with senior officials from various ministries including Vice Minister Mr. He Yafei from the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, Assistant Minister Mr. Wang Chao from the Ministry of Commerce, and Deputy Director-General Mr. Shen Yang from the Ministry of Education. They also met with religious leaders and business representatives from leading Chinese companies. The delegation then travelled to Tianjin via the Beijing-Tianjin Intercity Railway to experience the city's latest technologies in environmental protection and new energy development, and to meet with the Deputy Mayor of Tianjin, Mr. Yang Dongliang.

U.S. Journalists Explore Renewable Energy and Economic Developments in China

The Foundation continued its "Visiting Journalist Program" in the first half of 2010 by hosting two groups of prominent American journalists on tours of China to see first-hand its developments in various fields. One group focused on China's renewable energy projects and the other on China's economic development. The program provided the journalists a unique opportunity to see a diverse view of China's progress through visits to some of the most politically, economically and culturally significant cities across China including Beijing, Shanghai, Xi'an, Dalian, Yiwu, Jiayuguan and Dunhuang.

Ronald Brownstein from *The Atlantic*, Kathleen Deveny from *Newsweek*, Craig Gilbert from the *Milwaukee Journal Sentinel* and Bradford Plumer from *The New Republic* took part in the renewable energy tour. The journalists visited a number of research institutes and NGOs that promote clean energy. The group also visited a number of leading wind and solar power facilities and met with energy sector regulators from both the central and local governments.

Journalists of the economy tour included Shikha Dalmia from *Forbes and Reason Magazine*, Marilyn Geewax from *National Public Radio*, Ezra Klein from *The Washington Post*, Marjorie Miller from the *Los Angeles Times*, and Matthew Yglesias, a blogger from the Center for American Progress (CAP). The group met with experts from both the government and business sectors to discuss China's economic growth and its economic opportunities and challenges.

Both groups also took the opportunity to visit the Shanghai World Expo. At the end of the visit, the journalists met with Foundation Chairman, Mr. C.H. Tung in Beijing.

Former U.S. Congressmen Visit Beijing, Xi'an and Shanghai

In April 2010, the Foundation and the China Association for International Friendly Contact (CAIFC) hosted a visit for members of the United States Association of Former Members of Congress (USAFMC). The group comprised the Association's President Mr. John J. Rhodes III (R-Arizona); President-elect Mr. Dennis Hertel (D-Michigan); Mr. Louis Frey (R-Florida); Mr. Samuel Gejdenson (D-Connecticut) and Mr. William Zeliff (R-New Hampshire).



The delegation met with Mr. Lu Yongxiang, Vice-Chairman of the National People's Congress (NPC) Standing Committee, senior government officials from the People's Bank of China, Ministry of Foreign Affairs, Ministry of Commerce and representatives from such think-tank organizations as the Chinese Institute of International Studies. The group also visited major historic and cultural landmarks in Beijing and Xi'an and Shanghai.

U.S. Congressional Staffers Visit China

In collaboration with the Center for American Progress, the Energy Foundation and the Chinese People's Institute of Foreign Affairs, the Foundation facilitated a visit to China for a group of congressional staffers to learn first-hand about China's initiatives in the area of clean energy.

The five-day tour took place in April 2010 and covered Beijing, Guanting, Tianjin, Langfang and Baoding. During the trip, the delegation visited the Lishen Battery Factory, Guanting Goldwind Wind Farm, Baoding National High-technology Industrial Development Zone and ENN in Langfang.

The Foundation Collaborates with Primary Source

In an effort to support the rising demand for Chinese studies in the U.S., the Foundation is working with Primary Source to develop an online course for U.S. educators seeking to teach their students about China's culture and history.

The collaboration has resulted in the development of the organization's "Changing China: History and Culture Since 1644" program, a ten-week online course that covers Confucian values, the cultural diversity of China, the history of the Qing Dynasty, the Cultural Revolution, and modern China's rise to the world stage. Teachers from across the U.S. will be able to participate in the program through an innovative online platform. The pilot course for the "Changing China" program is expected to be launched in the fall of 2010.

In April, a group of distinguished U.S. educational leaders visited Beijing, Xi'an, and Hong Kong on a study tour organized by Primary Source. During the visits, they met with teachers in China to learn about the Chinese education system and to attend seminars on Chinese culture and values. The Massachusetts Commissioner of Elementary and Secondary Education, Mr. Mitchell Chester, was part of the delegation and returned to the United States with plans to promote "global education, foreign language study, and the use of technology".

China-U.S. Rule of Law Dialogue Program

The Foundation facilitated the engagement of a group of Chinese and American legal experts through a study program to discuss the development of China's rule of law. The first round of dialogues between the two sides took place in Beijing from July 29 to 30, 2010. Foundation Governor, Ms. Elsie Leung delivered the Opening Remarks on how the bilateral dialogue can help improve understanding of the Chinese legal and judicial systems. Topics discussed during this two-day program included the development of the Chinese legal system over the past six decades, Chinese constitutional law, the Chinese judicial system and judicial reform, criminal justice, legal education and WTO-related legal issues. A second round of dialogues is scheduled to take place sometime next year.
