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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

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General Population

Key Findings 1 of 3

- Despite all of the developments in and news surrounding U.S.-China relations, Americans' opinion of China has remained stable (21% favorable). However, of the seven countries tested only Russia and North Korea had lower favorable ratings.
- President Xi is viewed favorably by just 12% of Americans, the same rating given to President Putin. However, 58% view Putin unfavorably while just 39% view Xi unfavorably. Half of Americans are either neutral or unable to rate Xi.
- Pluralities of Americans view China as having a strong military (49%), being aggressive (46%), and being innovative (45%). Just one-in-five see China as peaceful (19%) or a friend of the U.S. (19%).
- Just 15% of Americans say China can be trusted in their dealings with the U.S., essentially unchanged since 2015. Two-in-five (41%) say China cannot be trusted. The rest are neutral or unsure.
- Fifteen percent of Americans rate the relationship between the U.S. and China
 positively while 35% rate it negatively; 29% expect that relationship to improve over
 the next ten years while 25% think it will worsen.
- Of ten issues concerning China Americans are most familiar with trade friction with the U.S. (57%), pollution in China (49%), Internet censorship (47%), and cybersecurity disputes with the U.S. (44%).

General Population

Key Findings 2 of 3

- Of the ten issues tested Americans are most concerned with trade friction with the U.S. (53% list it as one of their top three concerns), cybersecurity disputes with the U.S. (41%) and environmental pollution in China (34%).
- Americans hold the U.S. and China about equally responsible for current trade tensions with 23% blaming China, 21% blaming the U.S. and 39% blaming both equally.
- Half of Americans (51%) believe that trade friction between the U.S. and China is having a negative impact on the global economy.
- Most Americans believe that the U.S. and China will benefit equally from increased trade (37%) or are unsure who will benefit more (23%).
- One-third of Americans (36%) think the U.S. should engage and cooperate with China while 29% think the U.S. should try to limit China's global influence and 35% are not sure.
- Half of Americans (50%) think the recent imposition of tariffs between the two countries is having a negative effect on the trading relationship.
- One-third of Americans (34%) believe that U.S.-China educational and technological cooperation should be increased (22%) or maintained at current levels (12%) while 29% think it should be reduced. The rest are unsure.

Key Findings 3 of 3

- More Americans (44%) disapprove of President Trump's handling of relations with China than approve (37%).
- More Americans (29%) think China's economic growth is good for the U.S. than think it is harmful (19%) while half take a neutral position.
- Americans are divided on whether U.S. and China interests will lead to cooperation (39%) or to conflict (32%) with 29% unsure. This has not changed since 2015.
- The strongest messages in support of U.S.-China cooperation are:
 - The countries have common interests like climate change and anti-terrorism;
 - The countries have more to gain from cooperation than from conflict;
 - Cooperation will make it less likely that the countries will be drawn into armed conflict.
- Americans identify the most positive actions China has taken or could take as;
 - Helping to block expansion of North Korea's nuclear program;
 - Lifting millions of Chinese out of poverty and creating a powerful consumer market;
 - Investing in science and technology leading to important breakthroughs.

Washington Experts

Key Findings 1 of 3

- Just 9% of these Experts have a favorable opinion of China, down 7 points from 2015. Of the seven countries tested only Russia (3%) and North Korea (0%) have lower ratings.
- President Xi is viewed favorably by just 8% of these Experts.
 Vladimir Putin (1%) and Kim Jong-Un (1%) receive lower ratings.
 Only one-in-five Experts (22%) rate President Trump favorably.
- Majorities of these Experts view China as Aggressive (82%), Militarily Strong (69%), and Innovative (55%). Very few (6% or less) associate China with the six positives characteristics tested.
- Half (48%) say they are very (13%) or somewhat (35%) familiar with China's Belt and Road Initiative.
- Two-thirds (68%) say that China cannot be trusted in their dealings with the U.S.

Washington Experts

Key Findings 2 of 3

- Just 2% rate the China-U.S. relationship positively, down 30 points from 2015. However, one-third (34%) expect that relationship to improve over the next decade, the same as in 2015.
- Of the ten issues tested those most likely to directly impact the U.S. are rated of greatest concern – trade friction, cybersecurity, and intellectual property. The issues more likely to impact just China or its near neighbors are of much less concern.
- More of these Experts (35%) blame the U.S. than blame China (22%) for the current trade tensions between the two countries; 39% blame both equally.
- More than two-thirds (71%) strongly (45%) or somewhat (26%) disapprove of President Trump's handling of relations with China.





Washington Experts

Key Findings 3 of 3

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• The three strongest messages in support of promoting good China-U.S. relations are:

- The more the two countries cooperate the less likely they are to be drawn into armed conflict;
- Both countries can benefit more from cooperation than from conflict;
- The countries have mutual interests including climate change, artificial intelligence, anti-terrorism, and containing North Korea's nuclear capability.
- Those three messages together reach 94% of this Expert audience.
- China's cooperation with the U.S. to block expansion of North Korea's nuclear program is the action among ten tested that is viewed most favorably. It alone positively impacts 55% of the Expert audience.




On most slides, data are presented in a bar chart format seen below.

- If the question or data point was also in the 2015 survey, the colored number to the right shows the change since 2015. Where the data have increased or stayed the same the number is shown in green, and where the data have decreased the number is shown in red.








China's Favorability Rating by Generation

Americans under age 40 are more likely than older Americans to rate China positively.

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


President Xi's Favorability Rating by Generation

Americans under age 40 are two to three times more likely than older Americans to rate President Xi positively.

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



Americans' trust in China in their dealings with the U.S. has remained stable since 2015 with just 15% thinking the country is trustworthy. Those under age 40 are twice as likely (27%) to think China can be trusted.



U.S.-China Relationship

Americans' view of the U.S.-China relationship is somewhat more negative than it was in 2015 while their expectations for change in that relationship is stable. Those under age 40 rate the relationship more positively (27%) and are more optimistic about the future of it (34%).

Familiarity with Issues Concerning China

Trade friction between the U.S. and China is the only issue (of ten tested) familiar to a majority of Americans. One-third or fewer Americans are familiar with the other issues tested. Those over age 55 are much more likely to be familiar with these issues. **Question wording:** For each of the following issues concerning China please indicate how much you have heard or read about that issue using a five-point scale where "5" means you have heard or read a great deal and "1" means you have not heard or read anything at all.





U.S.-China Trade Tensions

Americans hold the U.S. and China about equally responsible for the current trade tensions and half think those tensions are having a negative impact on the global economy. Those over 55are more likely to hold China responsible while those under 40 are more likely to hold the U.S. responsible.











General Population M3 Message Testing

M3 Message Testing: Overview

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• We tested 10 messages using Prime Group's M3 methodology.

• M3 testing is a forced choice methodology requiring respondents to react to a series of screens, each with four messages.

 Respondents are asked to choose the strongest and the weakest message on each screen. Each message is repeated multiple times but always with a different set of "competing" messages.

• With this sample size (n=2,401) this methodology produces more than 96,000 unique data points, resulting in much greater precision and differentiation than traditional rating exercises which rely on each message being rated independently.





M3 Message Testing: Sample Screen Below are four reasons that some people give for why it is important for the U.S. and China to find ways to cooperate with one another and avoid excessive competition and conflict. Please read the reasons carefully and then select:

- the single **STRONGEST** reason for the U.S. and China to cooperate; and - the single **WEAKEST** reason for the U.S. and China to cooperate.

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• Preference Scores:

- Through the M3 process, respondents reveal their relative preferences for the each message.
- These scores are NOT percentages.
- Taken together the preference scores for all messages will always add to 100.
- In effect respondents collectively distribute 100 points across the messages based on their relative appeal.
- Reach Analysis:
 - While the preference scores tell us the relative ranking of the messages for all respondents, a message's "reach" equals the percentage of respondents ranking that item as their favorite or second favorite message.
 - The "reach" for any two messages equals the percentage of respondents ranking either message as their favorite or second favorite.
 - Our algorithm examines the total reach for every possible message combination and determines the message packages that have the broadest appeal.
 - As an analogy, think of individual messages as items on a restaurant menu. Similar menu items such as two types of steak attract the same type of customer. Adding different types of menu items, such as seafood or vegetarian selections, broaden the overall appeal of the menu by "reaching" different customer types.











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







Washington Experts M3 Message Testing

M3 Message Testing: Overview

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• We tested 10 messages using Prime Group's M3 methodology.

• M3 testing is a forced choice methodology requiring respondents to react to a series of screens, each with four messages.

 Respondents are asked to choose the strongest and the weakest message on each screen. Each message is repeated multiple times but always with a different set of "competing" messages.

• With this sample size (n=200) this methodology produces more than 8,000 unique data points, resulting in much greater precision and differentiation than traditional rating exercises which rely on each message being rated independently.

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• Preference Scores:

- Through the M3 process, respondents reveal their relative preferences for the each message.
- These scores are NOT percentages.
- Taken together the preference scores for all messages will always add to 100.
- In effect respondents collectively distribute 100 points across the messages based on their relative appeal.
- Reach Analysis:
 - While the preference scores tell us the relative ranking of the messages for all respondents, a message's "reach" equals the percentage of respondents ranking that item as their favorite or second favorite message.
 - The "reach" for any two messages equals the percentage of respondents ranking either message as their favorite or second favorite.
 - Our algorithm examines the total reach for every possible message combination and determines the message packages that have the broadest appeal.
 - As an analogy, think of individual messages as items on a restaurant menu. Similar menu items such as two types of steak attract the same type of customer. Adding different types of menu items, such as seafood or vegetarian selections, broaden the overall appeal of the menu by "reaching" different customer types.




